

Panel: Election Day Issues

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Crossover Voting Rules Pursuant to Act #2017-340

1. Determine your procedure:
 - Decide your plan for marking which party the voter has selected on the roster
 - Electronic Poll Books
 - Rubber stamps
 - Write "Dem" or "Rep" or "Issues Only"
 - Write "D" or "R" or "Issues Only"
 - Use of markers
 - Ensure all poll workers are trained to uniformly carry out your plan
 - Ensure all poll workers understand they are required to designate the party chosen for every voter
 - Inactive/Provisional
2. Ensure all poll list rosters, update forms and provisional affirmations are stored properly and delivered by the Sheriff to the Board of Registrars for processing of voter credit
3. Registrars use the party designations marked by your poll workers to assign voting credit to every voter that participated
4. If party designation is not properly determined, the Crossover Voting rule cannot be carried out according to law
5. We will contact all counties in which voters were not properly assigned voting credit
6. A court order might be required to open the boxes and determine which party a voter designated
7. For the Runoff Election, your poll lists will contain the party designation of the voter from the Primary Election (if that voter participated and voted a party ballot)

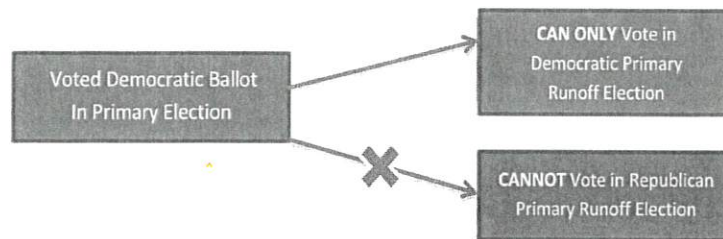
CROSS OVER VOTING RULES

Cross Over Voting Rules

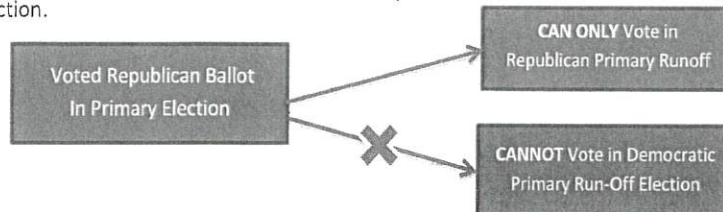
Effective August 1, 2017

According to Act #2017-340, Section 2 (a), if an elector votes in a Primary Election, he or she may vote in a subsequent Primary Runoff Election only if he or she voted in the Primary Election of the same political party for which the Runoff Election is being held. For those persons who did not vote in a Primary Election, they may choose either party's ballot in a Primary Runoff Election.

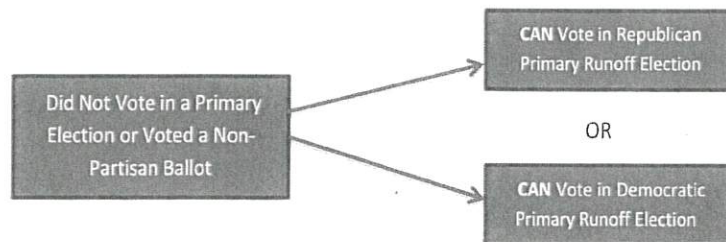
Explanation: If you vote in the Democratic Primary Election, you may only vote in the Democratic Runoff Election. You may not cross over and vote in the Republican Runoff Election.



Explanation: If you vote in the Republican Primary Election, you may only vote in the Republican Runoff Election. You may not cross over and vote in the Democratic Runoff Election.



Explanation: If you did not vote in a Primary Election, you may choose either a Democratic or Republican ballot in a Runoff Election.



The Cross-Over Rule starts over with each election cycle and only applies to Primary and Primary Runoff Elections. It does not apply to a General Election.
